#### Pastor McPike's Desk


Five hundred years ago right now, an Augustinian Monk was serving as professor of theology at the University of Wittenberg in Germany. He had been living a life where he felt he had not done enough – that he could never do enough to please God. His only picture of God was to see Him as a righteous judge who demanded perfection from His people. For those who fell short of God's expectation of perfection, God commanded be thrown into the fires of hell for all time. Eternal punishment was the only thing Luther saw. Making this view of God that much more real was a church establishment of the day that worked hard to exploit that view of an angry and vengeful God, offering a way out – for purchase. Much money could be made by frightening the faithful into thinking that the only way they could avoid the fires of hell was to pay for it.

As this monk studied the Bible, he found his change in understanding turning on a single phrase "the righteousness of God". For years, this phrase "the righteousness of God" meant the gold standard by which God judged us. For those who could not find a way to measure up — the only alternative was eternal damnation. The monk felt that simply could not be fair! Yes, for a time, the monk even hated God. How unfair of a perfect God to hold us to that same standard, an unattainable standard for all of us sinners. Who then can be saved?

Slowly, with much study, the monk came to a very different understanding of that phrase "righteousness of God". Certainly, God's righteousness is His perfection. Certainly, also, that perfection is what God expects of us. However, through the book of Romans, the monk began to understand that the "righteousness of God" coming to us by faith is a gift of God given to us by the life, death, and resurrection of Christ. In other words, certainly it is perfection. But it is perfection by which God looks at us and considers us perfect by virtue of our baptism. In baptism, the gift of faith is given to us, and as we live in that faith, we live covered with the righteousness of Christ. The monk discovered that Christ's righteousness was a gift given us by faith whereby our sins are covered. As God looks at us, He sees not our faults and failures. He sees Christ's righteousness.

This discovery prompted the monk to raise a challenge to the established practices of the day — practices that centered around selling God's merit for a price. The name of that monk, of course, is Martin Luther. Dr. Luther, the professor of theology, posted 95 Theses... 95 statements taking issue with how we are forgiven, how God accepts us, and His love for us. This was done on the eve of a church holiday, November 1. The challenge set off a firestorm throughout Europe and the western church, a "Reformation". Thus, October 31 is the date celebrated as Reformation.

This year, October 31, 2016, is 499 years after this event happened. The year 2017 is 500 years since Luther posted these theses. During this year, we are planning a variety of events to commemorate 500 years since Luther posted the 95 Theses. Adult Bible class will pause at least monthly to examine various people that shaped the conditions and circumstances of the Reformation. And there is the possibility of a trip to St. Louis and Perry County, Missouri sometime next year, where we can attend Trinity Lutheran Church, St. Louis, the church where C. F. W. Walther was pastor until he died. Watch for details on this special year.

#### **LWML News**

#### **LWML Meeting**

The LWML met on September 9 and began by singing the LWML song followed by the LWML pledge. Agnes Martinie had the devotion entitled "Strong Love". Debbie Lammle's topic was about our "Changeless God". 11 members were present. The minutes were read by Marsha Warsaw, and Deb Martin provided the treasurer's report with a balance of \$1,197.14. Both were approved. There was no correspondence from the seminary student but thank-you notes were read from Rick Hardesty and the organization for the pillowcase dresses. Thank yous were offered to all members who donated food and worked at the 4<sup>th</sup> of July bake sale. We made \$270.15. Thank yous also went out to all who donated to the baby bottle project with special thanks to Deb Martin for coordinating the event. We collected \$416.27. Thank yous were given to all who donated food to our members in need along with those who helped cleaned the church and the members who worked on the quilt for vicar.

We have completed 115 quilts so far, along with 115 pillowcase dresses. The quilts will be boxed and sent at the end of October with a monetary donation for shipping costs. Thanks to Terri Hooker who coordinates this and tracks the quilts. Upcoming quilt dates will be October 6 and November 3, and we will only work on a Saturday if we have the need.

The group discussed the celebration of LWML Sunday which will be held on October 9<sup>th</sup> with the theme "Come and See". Several members volunteered to help with the service. We will display the quilts beginning that Sunday through the end of the month.

Under new business, the group discussed some potential new projects to undertake. It was decided to support the Military Biblestick Program through Faith Comes by Hearing. This will run for the first 3 weeks in November to coincide with Veteran's Day. The Biblestick is a small audio player containing the New Testament and selected Psalms and will be sent to service men and women through chaplains. The group also discussed the possibility of making busy quilts for Alzheimer's patients or walker carriers.

Upcoming events: Fall Rally at Thomasboro on September 20. Five of our members will be attending. Camp Cilca retreat is on October 7 and 8 with registration deadline on September 30. The LWML CID convention will be held in Altamont on April 28 and 29, 2017. The national LWML convention is scheduled for June 22-25,

2017, in Albuquerque, New Mexico with the theme of "Jesus Christ Above All".

Sue VanWakeman and Debbie Martin served delicious refreshments. The next meeting will be on December 8 with Barb Whitehouse-Gercken having the topic and Connie Warsaw and Annette Warsaw serving. We will have gift exchange and reveal secret pals as well.

## **Church Council Minutes**

#### <u>Immanuel Lutheran Church of Osman Council Minutes</u>

#### August 3, 2016

Immanuel Lutheran Church of Osman's Church Council held its monthly meeting on August 3, 2016, with ten members present. Those attending were John Lammle, Don Warsaw, Bob Zimmerman, John Gercken, Debbie Lammle, Connie Warsaw, Diana Zimmerman, Shirley Sprau, Vicar Johnston, and Pastor McPike. Pastor opened the meeting with devotion from Luke 12, followed by prayer. Secretary, Debbie Lammle, read the minutes of the last meeting. Shirley Sprau made a motion to approve the minutes; John Gercken seconded; motion carried.

Pastor's Report: Pastor McPike thanked everyone who helped with the church float and distributed flyers which stated location and service times for Immanuel Osman along the Bellflower and Fisher Parade routes. Pastor suggested celebrations at Immanuel Osman for the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation, starting with recognizing Luther's birth and baptism on Sunday, November 13th, 2016. He also suggested a celebration recognizing Luther's death on Sunday, February 19, 2017, a celebration on June 25, 2017, recognizing the presentation of the Augsburg Confession, and another celebration on Sunday, October 29, 2017, recognizing the posting of the 95 Theses. On October 29th, Pastor suggested featuring important reformation figures and singing new and old Luther hymns. He will communicate

with organist Alicia Haggin to incorporate special music in the service. Pastor is meeting weekly with Vicar Johnston; also planning to attend the upcoming Education meeting and set a date for Christian Education Pastor informed the council that member, Susan Miller, was going through the Parish Nursing Program and requested a letter of recommendation from him to begin the program at Carle. The insurance for Susan Miller serving as Parish Nurse would be covered by Carle Hospital. Debbie Lammle made a motion to pay the \$75 for Susan's registration in the program; Diana Zimmerman seconded the motion; motion carried. The need for a nurse's station in the church was discussed with a possible location in the annex. It was also suggested that the annex might be a possible location for adult Sunday School. These topics will be discussed at a later meeting. Pastor mentioned a national known speaker, Faith Roberts, could be used as a possible speaker at Immanuel Osman. A black cassock for Vicar Johnston's farewell gift was suggested by Pastor McPike. John Gercken made a motion to purchase the cassock; Don Warsaw seconded; motion carried. Vicar expressed his appreciation for the gift and would get his measurements to Chairman Lammle. Vicar informed the council that an average of 5 to 6 members had been attending his Wednesday evening Bible Study. He also stated he was making daily shut-in visits. He would be gone for his military drill weekend the first weekend in August. Vicar stated he was meeting with Pastor McPike weekly and was moving back to Ft. Wayne seminary on September 2nd.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Bob Zimmerman gave the treasurer's report with a balance of \$73, 536.50. Don Warsaw made a motion to accept the report; Connie Warsaw seconded; motion carried.

Old Business: Discussion was held concerning payment of church staff while on leave. A motion was made by Diana Zimmerman and seconded by Shirley Sprau to pay the secretary for two months after her surgery, as previously done. Chairman Lammle will draft a policy for payment of hourly church employees. Don Warsaw volunteered to talk to Linda Warsaw concerning paid leave. Chairman Lammle asked Pastor McPike for suggestions for where to send local mission money starting in 2017.

<u>Sunday School Superintendent Report:</u> At the suggestion of Vicar Johnston, Connie Warsaw mentioned that a letter had been sent to non-member families who had participated in the past VBS. August 11<sup>th</sup> was set for the next Education Committee Meeting, and Christian

Education Sunday would be set sometime in September. Superintendent Warsaw stated she was researching a children's program for Christmas.

<u>Trustee Report</u>: Trustee, John Gercken, had no report concerning trustee issues. Chairman Lammle stated he would like to vote on the ramp remodel at the next voters' meeting and would discuss the updates on bids with Lee Whitehouse. Pastor McPike stated that it was difficult to hear while seated under the balcony, due to furnace noise, and suggested covering or rerouting existing duct work.

2016 church activities for the rest of the year were discussed. Chairman Lammle stated that the he was happy with the church participation at the Bellflower and Fisher parades when recognizing Senior member, Jeri Bidner. He stated the sub 40 activity was cancelled due to lack of participation. The details for the upcoming church picnic were discussed. Chairman Lammle will get the piano, screen, and projector needed for the youth presentation, and Vicar Johnston will be in charge of the games. Someone is also needed to pick up the grill. It was approved by the council to have the Vicar Farewell Potluck on August 21st after church. The hayrack ride and wiener roast is the next activity to plan, followed by the Pastor Appreciation/Reformation Fest on Sunday, October 30<sup>th</sup>. It was suggested to have the same polka band as last year. Debbie Lammle will inquire about the cost of the band.

Old Business: Chairman Lammle stated that the ILDOT approved the church sign on Route 150, and he would be ordering it soon. The Ladies Aid members will be serving as church greeters until September. Then the LWML ladies will take over.

Discussion was then held concerning the discontent of a member who did not get to attend the National Youth Gathering. It was decided the secretary would write a letter of apology to the family.

New Business: Chairman Lammle read from the constitution concerning the Nominating Committee for elections of new council members. He stated he would like to follow the constitution and then proposed that the committee would be comprised of himself and the current church council. He presented a partial draft of nominees for the upcoming year. He also stated that a sign-up will be placed beside the proposed ballot to allow others an opportunity to run for a certain position. It was suggested that an assistant treasurer position could be established who could be trained by the current treasurer. This change would require council and voter

approval. It was also suggested that an adult could fill the head usher position. This topic will be revisited again next month.

The discussion of what constitutes a quorum was then held. Chairman Lammle reviewed the LCMS guidelines for a quorum, as well as going over the wording in the constitution on the church website, a 2010 version of the constitution, and the original constitution which are not the same. The first two constitutions do not have documented changes as the original version. Later this year or the beginning of next year, Chairman Lammle would like the newly formed Constitutional Review Committee to review changes made to the constitution and try to locate documented voter approval of changes made.

A motion was made by Connie Warsaw and seconded by Diana Zimmerman to purchase a personal parking sign for senior member Jeri Bidner. Motion carried. Chairman Lammle will order this sign. Connie Warsaw then asked about a current list of active and inactive members. Secretary Lammle stated she had a typed list of members that is used for member sign-in before each voters' meeting. Pastor McPike stated there are three levels of members-baptized, communicant, and voting. There is an electronic list of baptized and communicant members that needs to be reviewed.

Connie Warsaw made the motion to adjourn; Debbie Lammle seconded; motion carried. The meeting ended with the Lord's Prayer.



OCTOBER 30<sup>TH</sup>
